rockstar!



#### AP Teacher Incentive Program RUSH January 8th Deadline



Some of you may have heard me talking about this. A+ has added AP 2-D Art to the list of teachers that can apply for the Individual AP Teacher Training and Incentive Program. I fought to have AP 3-D, AP Studio Art Drawing, and AP Music Theory but they were not included in the list. I will continue to try and get them included. Please review the cut and paste from an email sent to all curriculum directors, principals and others central office personnel in the state.

Individual AP Teacher Training and Incentive Program (ITIP) Application A+ College Ready, in partnership with the ALSDE, is releasing the application for its second cohort of AP teachers to participate in the new Individual AP Teacher Training and Incentive Program (ITIP). Questions can be submitted to <a href="mailto:teammy@aplusala.org">teammy@aplusala.org</a>.

- Program Goal Increase access to and success in AP courses and includes teacher training, teacher support, equipment, materials, and supplies, student study sessions, AP mock exams, incentives for teachers and students, and AP exam fee subsidies
- AP courses supported in ITIP Program- AP English Language and Composition; AP English Literature and Composition; AP U. S. History; AP U. S. Government & Politics; AP Macroeconomics; AP World History; AP Psychology; AP Calculus AB; AP Calculus BC; AP Statistics; AP Computer Science Principles; AP Computer Science A; AP Biology; AP Chemistry; AP Environmental Science; AP Physics 1; AP 2-D Art; and AP Spanish Language and Culture
- Application Eligibility ANY ALABAMA PUBLIC SCHOOL teacher who has
  not been an A+ College Ready Advanced Placement program teacher in the
  past. (Note: If a teacher was supported by A+ College Ready in one subject,
  but now teaches a different subject, s/he is eligible to apply.); and this
  includes: 1) Teachers from previous A+ College Ready schools who were not
  teaching their AP courses during the time of the grant program; and 2)
  Teachers from schools that have never been affiliated with A+ College
  Ready.

#### JefCoEd Art Bus

My name is Shelly Bailey and I am the Visual Art Supervisor for the Jefferson County Board of Education in Birmingham Alabama. I had a dream to write a grant to convert a school bus into a mobile art classroom. We have close to 36,000 kids in our school district. 56 schools to be exact. But I





have about 13 schools with no visual art teachers. This may not sound like a lot but when you add up the students that comes to over 6,000 kids who are not getting to experience the joy of visual art making and creativity. Well I won the grant! AND huge support from my superintendent for my vision. We begin the planning of our build out next week with a large team of people. We will take the next school year to do the build out using three of our high schools to do the actual work partnering with our CTE programs and our county director Bobby Jackson. We will have multiple programs involved and skills such as: construction, wiring, welding, HVAC, auto paint and body, and graphic design. Scores of teachers, professionals, and students will have their hands on this project. I'd like to take you on our journey every step of the way.
